

Current Budget Proposal: Upcoming Year Revenue Sharing Cut Nearly 30%

Almost all the bills to be taken up by the 124th Legislature have been reviewed and given a recommendation by the appropriate legislative committees. The bills that haven't yet been enacted or killed outright are now waiting in a queue to be debated and fully processed by the full Legislature on the floors of the House and Senate.

The big bill for this session is LD 1671, the supplemental state budget. That bill has not yet been reported out of the Appropriations Committee.

The bottom line of the supplemental budget has been something of a moving target. The state's General Fund biennial budget enacted last spring appropriated \$5.814 billion in General Fund revenue to provide state services over the FY 2010-2011 biennium.

After a re-forecasting of state revenue in late November 2009, it was determined that the gap between revenue and appropriations was \$438 million, and a supplemental state budget was submitted by the Governor that recommended a number of cuts in state funding to bridge that gap.

In a couple of steps taken over the first two weeks of March, that \$438 million gap was whittled down to a gap of a little more than \$300 million. About 35% of that "new-found" money was provided through an updated revenue

forecast conducted in late February. The remainder became available to the state through changes approved in Washington to certain federal Medicaid matching rates, which serve to increase the federal share and reduce the state share of financing various Medicaid services.

The availability of that money has resulted in a partial restoration of some of the proposed cuts to local government, including General Purpose Aid to Local Schools (GPA) and municipal revenue sharing.

The GPA numbers. For FY 11, it looks like the final numbers for GPA will be as follows:

- Total EPS allocation = \$1.949 billion
- Total GPA = \$877.25 million, which equals 45% of EPS. As a matter of ignored law, the state is supposed to provide at least 55% of EPS.
- Total GPA plus federal "Recovery

Act" school funding = \$936 million, equaling 48% of EPS.

The final spreadsheet showing the GPA distribution for each school system has not yet been posted by the Dept. of Education.

The Revenue Sharing numbers. With respect to municipal revenue sharing, the final numbers, on the basis of the most recent revenue projection, look to be as follows:

Total Revenue Sharing Distribution without legislative raids = \$123.8 million

Total legislative raid = \$35.3 million, a 28.5% cut to the total distribution.

(Note: This cut does not include the "natural reduction" in revenue sharing associated with lower-than-projections of state sales and income tax revenue.)

The town-by-town impacts of the cuts to revenue sharing are on the following pages.

Explanation. As a matter of law, municipal revenue sharing must be used to reduce real estate property tax rates. The program was started nearly 40 years ago and provides limited municipal access to broad-based tax revenue streams in recognition of the high property tax burden, property tax inequities and as an alternative to the direct “local option” sales and income taxes municipalities are authorized to implement in most other states.

The column with the heading “FY 11 Natural Distribution” shows how much revenue sharing would be distributed to each town and city in Maine between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011 if the revenue sharing program was not tampered with by the Legislature. As it was originally designed, revenue sharing is funded by a fixed percentage (now 5%) of state sales and income tax revenue. Therefore, in a downturned economy, municipal

revenue sharing is “naturally” reduced in the same way and to the same degree as the state’s sales and income tax revenue. This column shows the distribution of that naturally-reduced revenue sharing during the upcoming fiscal year.

The column with the heading “FY 11 with Legislative Cuts” shows how much revenue sharing will be distributed (according to the most recent revenue projections) after taking into account the “transfer”, whereby the Legislature takes \$35 million out of the naturally-reduced revenue sharing program and places it in the state’s General Fund to financially support state programs. This \$35 million “legislative transfer” is the most updated version of the FY 11 revenue sharing cut currently within the proposed supplemental state budget (LD 1671).

The municipalities are organized alphabetically according to each county.

LD 1820 – An Act To Exempt Certain Necessary School Auxiliary Buildings for New Heating Systems from Referendum Requirements.

IN THE HOPPER

Criminal Justice & Public Safety

LD 1817 – An Act To Implement the Recommendations of the Working Group Concerning Domestic Violence and Firearms. (Reported by Sen. Gerzofsky of Cumberland County; additional cosponsors.)

This bill requires a law enforcement officer to seize all firearms from a person upon arrest for certain crimes, such as murder, assault, criminal threatening, terrorizing, stalking, criminal mischief, domestic violence assault, domestic violence criminal threatening, etc. The bill also requires all law enforcement agencies to adopt a written policy for the seizure of firearms and safe storage of firearms seized by a law enforcement officer in a domestic violence arrest.
